#### September 15, 2020



For the first time since March, the Board of Supervisor's **met at the dais in the Board Auditorium**, newly outfitted with plexiglass barriers, limited seating in the audience and masks required for all. While it was not "back to normal", it was perhaps the **next step to our "new normal"**.



During the meeting we discussed many weighty issues ranging from removal of Civil War Memorials to banning guns in Fairfax County facilities and outdoor sites. The Board had a 2:15 a.m. adjournment due to hearing from many residents on a variety of topics, including more than 20 speakers on the Civil War Memorial topic and almost 100 on the gun control ordinance. I carefully listened to each public hearing speaker and I have heard from many residents on all sides of the issue. For Mount Vernon residents' concerns, I've been assured that this ordinance will not impede the rightful and lawful ability of hunters to access hunting areas that are either in or nearby Fairfax. I voted in support of the ordinance that prohibits weapons in County buildings, parks and at special events, as it provides another level of safety and it protects us in our public buildings and parks. However, after listening to about six hours of testimony and hearing the real stories and deep feelings regarding guns and safety, I recognize that individual needs and perspectives on this issue can never be fully reconciled. I understand that ultimately, our role in County government is to find a path that results in safer County properties for all.

Another busy public hearing was on the removal three publicly owned Civil War monuments located at the Fairfax County Judicial Complex. While the Board ultimately decided to remove the monuments, it also directed the Fairfax County History Commission Marker Committee and the Virginia Department of Historic Resources to study and prepare one of more markers to more fully describe the historic context of the actions at the Fairfax Courthouse, including those that occurred at the Battle of the Fairfax Courthouse and other periods of history that occurred at the Courthouse. Topics in history could also include the reconstruction era, voting at the courthouse and the experiences of the African American community.

**Thank you to everyone** who took time out of their busy schedules, and into the wee hours of the morning, to come **testify on these important issues**.

#### **Additional Meeting Highlights:**

- Added \$12 million to the Fairfax Rise: COVID-19 Small Business and NonProfit Relief Grant Program.
- 2. Approved an additional allocation of \$20.1 million of CARES Act funding for FCPS's response to COVID-19.
- Requested funding for a complete historical review of the Gum Springs
   Community to create a recommended management plan that could clearly define, preserve, and celebrate this historic area.
- 4. Adopted an ordinance to establish an **economic incentive program** in five districts, including the **Richmond Highway Corridor**.
- 5. Declared October 7, 2020 as Energy Efficiency Day.

As an outcome of my Fairfax Green Initiatives #1, we adopted a strengthened

Sustainable Development Policy for County Capital Projects. The updated policy provides incremental steps to improve building energy performance and reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions for all new construction and major renovations of County buildings. The policy target is Net Zero Energy eligibility for these projects by 2031. While I would like to see the County achieve this goal much sooner and will continue to ask for a more aggressive approach, County staff have acknowledged they will be doing Net Zero projects when possible prior to 2031.

I know many of you are interested in the **Fairfax Peak project proposed** at the I-95 Lorton Landfill and would like to know more about it. This week's action was to authorize a **public hearing on October 6** to consider whether the County will permit **Alpine-X LLC** additional **access to the proposed site** to **do on-site research and conduct studies** to determine the site feasibility.

#### **Administrative Items**

#### **Authorized Public Hearings on:**

- Proposed County Code amendments adding requirements for home child care facilities for additional out-of-state criminal background checks and sex offender registry searches for any adult who has lived in another state in the preceding five years. Public hearing will be held on October 20.
- Proposed amendment to the **Erosion and Sedimentation Control Ordinance** that strengthens enforcement. Public hearing will be held on **November 17**.
- Proposal to vacate and **abandon a portion of White Spruce Way**. Public hearing will be held on **October 20**.
- Permit **Alpine-X LLC** access to the proposed indoor ski facility site to do on-site research and conduct studies. Public hearing will be held on **October 6**.

You can now **testify remotely by phone, video** and in writing, as well as providing inperson testimony.

#### **Action Items**

**Item 6:** Authorized the Fairfax County Department of Transportation (FCDOT) to apply for **funding in the amount of \$586,393**, including \$117,279 in Local Cash Match. The funds will be used for **preliminary engineering** for completion of the **southern portion of the** 

Mason Neck Shared Use Trail. Many thanks to Joe Chudzik for his many years of work to get this trail completed. The full item can be read on pages 388 - 390 of the Board Package.

**Item 10:** Approved updates to the **Sustainable Development Policy** for County Capital Facilities Projects. The updates include incremental energy performance improvements and green building standards with a target of achieving **Net Zero Energy eligibility by no later than 2031** for all new and major County building projects. The full item can be read on pages 473 - 487 of the Board Package.

**Item 11:** Authorized an **additional \$12 million in funding** for Fairfax Rise: COVID-19 Small Business and NonProfit Relief Grant Program. This is in addition to the **\$46 million already allocated** to support the **1,000 applicants on the wait list** for the program. The full item can be read on pages 488- 491 of the Board Package.

**Proclaim October 7, 2020, Energy Efficiency Day in Fairfax County** - Joint with Supervisor Penny Gross

**Energy Efficiency Day** is an opportunity to share the transformative **benefits of saving energy**. Energy efficiency is the heart of a **clean energy future** and critical to the **Board's climate action commitments**. Energy efficiency continues to be the cheapest, quickest, and cleanest way to meet our energy needs and **reduce utility bills for residential**, business and industrial customers. Energy efficiency can also make our **homes and workspaces healthier**, safer and more comfortable.

**Smarter energy** use reduces the amount of electricity we need to power our lives, which helps **avoid power plant emissions** that can harm our health, pollute our air and warm our climate. **Cutting energy waste saves U.S. consumers billions of dollars** on their utility bills every year, **up to \$500 per household** from appliance efficiency standards alone. #### Action

Directed:

- A proclamation be prepared with my, Chairman McKay and Supervisor Gross' signatures designating October 7, 2020, as Energy Efficiency Day in Fairfax County.
- The Office of Public Affairs to register the County as a participant in Energy Efficiency Day 2020 on the official website, where information can be found to publicize energy efficiency tips and information in recognition of this day.

## Additional Funding towards the Completion of Architectural and Community Survey for Gum Springs Historic District - Joint with Chairman Jeff McKay

Throughout almost 200 years of history and existence, the **Gum Springs community** tells the story of the **oldest free sustained African American community** in Fairfax County. Although the history of Gum Springs is recognized by the County, **no comprehensive cultural resource survey** has been conducted for this area. In 2018, during the adoption process of the Embark Richmond Highway Comprehensive Plan Amendment, the Gum Springs Community was identified as an **important historic and cultural community** needing further study.

In June 2020, County Heritage Resources staff, working with the Gum Springs Historical Society, applied for and received a Certified Local Government (CLG) grant in the amount of \$10,800. This money, including a non-federal share of \$16,700 (\$27,500 total), is intended to prepare and complete a National Register of Historic Places Nomination Form for the Pride of Fairfax Lodge #298 (former Odd Fellows meeting hall), located at 7809 Fordson Road, Alexandria, VA. #### Action

Approved a budget consideration item of \$60,000 as part of fourth quarter carryover to be allocated to the Fairfax County Department of Planning and Development to further fund the cultural resource survey, a complete historical context of Gum Springs, and to develop a management plan with recommendations.

#### Walking Wednesdays - Joint with Supervisor Dalia Palchik

This year, in the midst of the pandemic and school closures, Walking Wednesdays will

be a County wide community program designed to promote community values of physical and mental health. FCPS Safe Routes to School is pairing with Fairfax County Park Authority's Move Your Way campaign and Healthy Strides.

Engaging in physical activity is often **easier for people when they can join with others**. Even though we will be social distancing we can walk together apart. This program encourages **Walking Champions in each neighborhood** to help get out the word and engage their neighbors to participate. Each community could find **creative ways to encourage and promote safe walking, biking, and outdoor exercise** before school or work.

The first Walking Wednesday will take place on **October 7, 2020** which is also Walk to School Day. Even though we will not be walking to schools this fall **community members** and **families are encouraged to walk** in their neighborhoods and register as a family, school or neighborhood. **Supervisors Dalia Palchik and Dan Storck** will be **participating and promoting** in their districts and encourage our colleagues to join as well!

#### Action:

Directed the Office of Public Affairs to publicize the Walking Wednesdays program in collaboration with FCPS and the Park Authority's Move Your Way campaign.

#### **Public Hearings**

Consider Adopting an Ordinance to Establish an Economic Incentive Program (Mount Vernon, Dranesville, Lee, Mason and Providence Districts)

Adopted an ordinance to establish an **economic incentive program** for several areas in the County, including the the **Richmond Highway Corridor**. The ordinance - Incentives to Encourage Economic Growth - offers **regulatory incentives** in the form of **concurrent processing** of development applications and associated Comprehensive Plan amendments, inclusion of development applications in the LDS Project Management Program, **a fee reduction of 10 percent for site plan review**, and a **partial real estate tax abatement** to private sector developers who assemble and develop properties in accordance with the ordinance and **consistent with the vision of the Comprehensive Plan**. Consider Amendment of Chapter 11 of the County Code to Reflect Amendments to State Anti-Discrimination and Fair Housing Statues Enacted during 2020 GA Session

Amended to reflect recently approved **State Anti-Discrimination and Fair Housing statues**, following the passing of SB 868 and HB 6 of 2020 GA Session, **incorporating all protections to County Code**. Protections under these news statues include:

- **prohibits discrimination in private employment** based on sexual orientation and gender identity.
- **prohibits discrimination in public accommodations** on the basis of sexual orientation, gender identity, or status as a veteran.
- **prohibits discrimination in credit** on the basis of sexual orientation, gender identity, pregnancy, childbirth or related medical conditions, disability, and status as a veteran.
- adds discrimination on the basis of an individual's sexual orientation, gender identity, or status as a veteran as an unlawful housing practice.
- prohibits discrimination on the basis of a person's source of funds to the list of unlawful discriminatory housing practices.

Additional amendments bring the Fairfax County Fair Housing Act into fuller conformity with the Virginia Fair Housing Act. Including:

- providing reasonable accommodations for "assistance animals" that provide assistance or emotional support to persons w/ Disabilities.
- limits the exemption of "making and publishing of discriminatory statements or advertisements by property owners in connection to sale and renting of housing".
- **limits the exception** of "housing for older persons" and "familial status.

## Consider the Adoption of Amendments to Chapter 6 of the Fairfax County Code Relating to Weapons

Amended County Code to prohibit the possession, carrying and transportation of

**firearms**, ammunition, components or combination thereof in the following areas:

- in any building, or part thereof, owned or used by the County, or by any authority or local governmental entity created or controlled by the County, for governmental purposes.
- in any public park owned or operated by the County, or by any authority or local governmental entity created or controlled by the locality.
- in any recreation or community center facility operated by the County, or by any authority or local governmental entity created or controlled by the County.
- in any public street, road, alley, or sidewalk or public right-of-way or any other place
  of whatever nature that is open to the public and is being used by or is adjacent
  to a permitted event or an event that would otherwise require a permit.

Arda, SP 2020-MV-011 Appl. under Sect. 8-914 of the Zoning Ordinance to permit a reduction to minimum yard requirements based on an error in building location to permit an accessory storage structure (shed) to remain 1.5 ft. from the west side lot line and 1.3 ft. from the rear lot line. Located at 6752 Blanche Dr., Lorton, on approx. 8,132 sq. ft. of land zoned R-5.
- Nickolas A Ploutis & Gissel Ploutis, A 2020-MV-005 Appl. under Sect. 18-301 of the Zoning Ordinance. Appeal of a determination that the appellant is allowing the use of a dwelling unit for transient occupancy (short-term lodging), without a short-term lodging permit, in the R-4 District in violation of Zoning Ordinance provisions. Located at 2520 Belleview Ave., Alexandria, on approx. 6,270 sq.ft. of land zoned R-4.
- Nickolas A Ploutis & Gissel Ploutis, A 2020-MV-012 Appl. under Sect. 18-301 of the Zoning Ordinance. Appeal of a determination that the appellant is allowing the use of a dwelling unit for transient occupancy (short-term lodging), without a short-term lodging permit, in the R-4 District in violation of Zoning Ordinance provisions. Located at 6105 North Kings Hwy, Alexandria on approx. 6,836 sq. ft. of land, zoned R-4.
