

Existing Shelter Location


- This project is replacement of the existing shelter with a new facility on the same site
- The existing Patrick Henry Shelter is located at 3080 Patrick Henry Drive, Falls Church, VA
- The new Patrick Henry Place will provide 16
 Permanent Supportive Housing units for families with children
- The project is part of CIP and funding was provided through the 2016 Bond Referendum





Existing Surrounding Neighborhoods










Changing Needs

- Fairfax County is converting the facility from temporary, emergency shelter to permanent supportive housing.
- Referrals to the Patrick Henry Family Shelter have decreased by 69 percent in five years.
- Contributing Factors:
 - New approaches in preventing and ending homelessness.
 - Innovative, cost-effective homeless assistance programs.
 - Macro-level economic and demographic changes.



- Staff are monitoring the demand for emergency shelter as the community enters the third year of the pandemic, when many community members experienced serious health crises or lost their jobs.
- Alternative shelter options are being considered to meet the demand following the conversion of Patrick Henry.

What is Permanent Supportive Housing?

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) is:

- Community-based housing without a designated length of stay.
- Supportive services are provided to assist persons with a disability to live independently.
- Program participants are tenants with leases, which is terminable only for cause.

It is not **Emergency Shelter**, which is:

- Designed for temporary stays to resolve a housing crisis.
- Dedicated to people experiencing homelessness in general, or for specific sub-populations.
- Does not require occupants to sign leases or occupancy agreements.



PSH Services

- Families and individuals experiencing homelessness sometimes need more than affordable housing.
- Supportive services are especially helpful for people who:
 - Have disabilities or chronic health conditions.
 - Have experienced domestic violence.
 - Are older adults and transition age youth.
 - Are veterans.
- Case managers help residents:
 - Meet basic needs.
 - Increase income through employment and/or public benefits.
 - Connect residents to ongoing local resources, such as primary care, mental health, etc.
 - Increase tenancy skills.
- Volunteers often assist by:
 - Providing in-kind donations like school supplies, children's toys, and more.
 - Hosting celebrations around the holidays.



Benefits of PSH

For <u>program participants</u>:

- An end to their homelessness.
- Housing stability for future success and self-sufficiency.

For neighborhoods and community:

- Less turnover of neighborhood residents.
- Greater stability.
- A new, well designed, and attractive building that improves community appearance.
