4 Things To Know About All This Rain



The county has received a lot of heavy precipitation this week and it is not letting up any time soon. Here are four things you should know:

1.) Flash Flood Watch

A Flood Watch means there is a potential for flooding based on current forecasts. You should monitor later forecasts and be alert for possible Flood Warnings. Those living in areas prone to flooding should be prepared to take action should flooding develop.

Please keep children away from creeks and streams as the water may rise quickly.

2.) Turn Around, Don't Drown

Flooding is one of the leading causes of weather-related fatalities in the U.S. On average, flooding claims nearly 90 lives each year. More than half of these deaths occur in motor vehicles when people attempt to drive through flooded roadways.

This happens because people underestimate the force and power of water, especially when it is moving.

- Just 6 inches of fast-moving water can knock over and carry off an adult.
- 12 inches of water can float a small car. If that water is moving, it can carry that car away.
- 18 to 24 inches of flowing water can carry away most vehicles, including large SUVs.

Any time you come to a flooded road, walkway, or path, follow this simple rule: Turn Around Don't Drown.

3.) Watch for Downed Trees

The combination of wet soil and potentially heavy wind gusts could cause trees to uproot and fall over. Here are some tips to keep in mind.

If a Tree Hits Your Home -

- Get everyone safely out of your house. Use your cellphone or go to a neighbor and call 9-1-1.
- 2. Go to a nearby shelter (another home or open public facility) to stay dry and out of the elements.
- 3. Stay away from the home until public safety employees can access the home for structural stability and ensure utilities are controlled.
- 4. Only after all of these safety measures have taken place should you call your insurance company.

4.) Prepare for Power Outages

As the storm continues, you may well find yourself without power. Be prepared and know what to do before you power goes out.

If Your Power Goes Out -

- Report your outage! Never assume a neighbor has reported it.
 - **Dominion Virginia Power:** 1-866-DOM-HELP (1-866-366-4357), TTY 711; <u>view outage map</u>
 - Northern Virginia Electric Cooperative (NOVEC): 1-888-335-0500
 or 703-335-0500, TTY 711; view outage reports
- Use a flashlight or battery-powered lantern for emergency lighting. Never use candles.
- Unplug electrical equipment until a steady power supply returns.
- If you have a police, fire or medical emergency, <u>call or text 9-1-1</u>. For non-emergency needs, call 703-691-2131.

Have you ever wanted to meet Moose and be in the next <u>#MondayswithMoose</u> post? Come hang out with Moose and get your picture taken with him!


Give your favorite furry K9 a big hug, belly rub, and a treat - and get to chat and hang out with officers. This event is open to Moose fans of all ages!

Driver Safety Assistant - CarFit Program

Volunteers are needed to help older adults maximize their vehicular safety under the CarFit program. Participants in the program drive their cars to a specified location where CarFit volunteers help the drivers adjust their car's seat, mirrors, and other features to maximize their comfort and safety. Working under the supervision/guidance of CarFit Event Coordinators, volunteers will review a 12-point safety checklist with participants. Volunteers must be licensed drivers, have good time management skills and be able to stoop down. A four-hour mandatory training will be held on Thursday, September 6, 2018 at the Mott Center in Fairfax.

New Online Form Available to Report Construction Concerns



The Site Construction Hotline now has an <u>online form</u> for residents to report potential construction violations in the community. This form is in addition to the phone number (703-324-7470), which is monitored weekdays, evenings and weekends by on-call county inspectors. Complaints received via the online form will be addressed on the next business day.

In addition to the online form, residents can now monitor the status of their complaints online. All complaints, whether submitted via phone or online, will be able to be viewed publicly, though residents will have the option of submitting them

anonymously. The online report is updated weekly.

The phone number and online form were put in place to respond to residents with concerns about development projects in their communities, such as:

- malfunctioning erosion and sedimentation controls
- drainage problems
- tracked mud on the roadway
- construction activity within a tree-save area
- or any activities that may harm the environment, cause safety risks, or damage another property.

Land Development Services' inspectors work daily with developers to ensure that the many construction projects in our county are conducted in the safest and least disruptive manner possible, but residents often have a closer vantage point to notice if issues arise.

Important information:

- When calling the hotline, or filling out the form, callers should provide an address and a description of the problem.
- If a hazardous material incident or other emergency is suspected, call 911 immediately.
- Never trespass on private property to get pictures or investigate a development project.
- The hotline and online form are the best avenues for residents seeking answers and resolution to these issues.


Video: Immunizations Protect Yourself and Your Community
